Dear President Falconer:

The Senate of Victoria University has given most serious deliberations to the proposals of the Minister of Education which you have forwarded for its consideration.

For over eighty years the course in Victoria College has been a four year one and while it was felt the proposed changes might seriously diminish the influence of the College upon the life of its students, the Senate endeavoured rather to consider the matter from the viewpoint of the educational welfare of the province at large.

Unanimously it was decided that to transfer the honour courses to local centres would not only act injuriously upon the University, but would be unwise for the following reasons:

1. It would require such a multiplication of equipment in the various High Schools and Collegiate Institutes that the cost would exceed that now required for this work in the University. For this reason it was feared the work would be done with very inadequate buildings and apparatus.
2. It was also believed that unless teachers were set apart exclusively for this special work it would be exceedingly difficult to secure such teaching as would maintain the present high standards of the University. Even if such teachers were secured and appointed to this specific work, the Senate believed they would be handicapped by being part of an institution whose spirit and methods of teaching would be necessarily adapted to work of a lower grade and younger students.
3. The fact that these students had already been five or six years in High School or Collegiate Institute strongly indicated the wisdom of removal to the new surroundings and methods of teaching of the University.

On these grounds, therefore, of cost, efficiency, and the new stimulus which University life would give the student, the Senate unanimously pronounced against the proposed change.

(President Falconer) -2-

II. With respect to the transference of the Pass, (which the Senate believes would be better designated the General Course) it was recognised that present conditions are not entirely satisfactory. How far the proposed change would improve matters is problematic, but the Senate, knowing how diverse are the causes of these unsatisfactory conditions, was compelled to believe that under the proposed change most of them would only be postponed to emerge in what might be called the second, but would really be the first, year of the University course. All agreed that such would be a more deplorable condition than the present.

It is believed by the Senate that a certain percentage of students now coming to the University for First Year pass work would be better advised to remain another year at home and under the close supervision and methods of teaching of the High School or Collegiate Institute. The suggested change would be an advantage to such students, as it would make compulsory what now is optional. Without any disability on the part of the University any student may now postpone his coming to the University until Senior Matriculation, and yet only a small and diminishing number avail themselves of this right. To the Senate it was very significant that students coming now for their first year pass work to the University do so by the deliberate choice of their parents. When it is remembered that the average age of these young men and women is over nineteen years, and that they have already spent four or five years at the High School, it is not difficult to see why the parents believe a change to the University advisable, and the Senate knowing intimately the facts of the case had no doubt that in the great majority of cases this choice has been abundantly justified by results. Not a few of these students do so well in their first year pass that they are gladly admitted to some of the important honour courses of the second year.

It was evident to the Senate that the proposed change could work an injury and an injustice to the following classes of students:-

- (a) Young men and women who for various reasons are not in a position to take a University Course, until later in life. The place of such is not with the boys and girls in the High Schools, but in the University, and their entrance there should not be delayed a year longer than is necessary.
- (b) Students who require courses of study which High Schools and Collegiate Institutes could not possibly or do not supply. Young men preparing for the ministry must have Oriental languages and Greek. Only the University can meet this need of a large class of students in which Victoria College is particularly interested.

(President Falconer) -3-

(c) The Senate was particularly concerned with a class of students, now quite numerous, which under the proposed change would be greatly increased. At present many young men and women at our High Schools and Institutes are living in boarding houses where the intellectual and cultural environment is far from desirable. These have heard of residential accommodation, made possible by large gifts of generous donors, where proper supervision and environment are provided. To deprive these young men and women of the fullest possible use of such provision would call forth the protest not only of Victoria College and the Church which at no little sacrifice has erected and furnished these buildings, but also of the parents of these students throughout the Province.

While the Senate with these considerations in mind disapproved the proposed changes, it believed that something might be done to improve conditions.

For one thing the Senate believed the present age at which the students are entering the University is higher than is necessary. Its judgment is there is too much rigidity in the present system, and that those possessing in large measure the ability and aptitude for study are not adequately provided for. The real wastage is not to be found in the failures of the Freshman year, but in the loss of the time of the more capable boys and girls, who might easily pass Junior Matriculation by or before their seventeenth year. Teachers should be encouraged to select and advance these boys and girls, who at present are sacrificed to an exaggerated idea of uniformity and standardization. Otherwise such students lose zest for their work, with disastrous consequences.

The Senate further believes the present Matriculation examination held on the instalment plan is not a sufficient test of the fitness of students for University work.

The Senate did not take into consideration any rights or claims which Victoria University may have under the Federation Act, or any rights possessed under her present Charter. This, however, is of course submitted without any prejudice to these rights.

Revision of Charter

The Chairman then asked Mrs. J. R. L. Starr to address the Senate regarding the progress of the work of revision of the Charter of Victoria University.

Mr. Starr explained the general purpose of the revision and read extracts from the draft of the Charter dealing with the constitution of the Senate, and Councils of the Faculty of Arts and of Theology. Members of the Senate were invited to address questions to Mr. Starr.

Revision of Fac. Charter.

The Registrar read a letter from the Secretary of the Faculty of Theology containing the following motion passed by that body at a recent meeting:

"Moved by Professor MacMillan,
Seconded by Dean McLaughlin and unanimously approved:

"That the Faculty of Theology of Victoria University are of opinion that the interior management of the teaching and examining of students should be under their control, subject only to the superior authority of the Senate, without the addition of others who are not in constant touch with the life and work of the college as carried on in the class-rooms."

It was moved by Dr. Burns, seconded by Professor Lang, that Dean McLaughlin be asked to arrange for a joint meeting of the Faculties of Theology of Victoria University and of Union Theological College to consider further the matter of this resolution.

Recommendations of Faculty of Theology on Revised Charter.

Professor Robertson read and explained the recommendations by the Faculties of Victoria College of certain clauses to be incorporated in the revised Charter to which Professor Sissons added a recommendation which had been accidentally omitted from Professor Robertson's report.

The recommendations are as follows:

There shall be a Council of the Faculty of Arts, of which the President of Victoria College shall be chairman, and which shall consist of all permanent members of the teaching staff in Arts together with one professor in the department of Religious Knowledge appointed by the Faculty of Theology.

The Council of the Faculty of Arts shall have the following powers and duties:

- (1) To make rules and regulations for governing its own proceedings, including the determining of the quorum necessary for the transaction of business.
- (2) Subject to the provisions of this Act and to the approval of the Board, to exercise direction, guidance and oversight of the work and life of the College, and, to make such rules and regulations as may be required for this purpose.
- (3) To transact such business as may arise that concerns the faculty as a whole.
- (4) To deal with and decide on all applications and memorials by students or others upon which the action of the faculty is required.
- (5) To conduct all examinations held by Victoria College.
- (6) To elect such representatives of the Faculty of Arts as the University Act, 1906, may authorize.
- (7) To consider and report to the Board of Regents and to the Senate or to either of them upon such matters affecting Victoria College as to the Council may seem meet.

The committee furthermore is of the opinion that clauses should be drafted providing:

- (1) That joint meetings of the Faculties of Arts and Theology may be called by the Chancellor at the request of either Faculty.
- (2) That there shall be a Registrar of Victoria University who shall also be the Secretary of the Senate and who shall be the official custodian of all records and papers of the Senate, including the lists of graduates and holders of diplomas, as well as the records of examination results and of the standing of students in each Faculty. He shall also conduct the elections of the representatives of the Graduates upon the Board of Regents, and the Senate of Victoria University.
- (3) That appointments to the teaching staff in Arts be made by the Board of Regents upon the nomination of the Chancellor of Victoria University after consultation with the President and Faculty of the College.
- (4) That the appointments of representatives to the Board of Regents to be elected by the graduates in Arts and the alumni of the theological colleges respectively be according to the number of living members of each group.

The committee furthermore is of the opinion that clauses should be drafted providing:

- (1) That joint meetings of the Faculties of Arts and Theology may be called by the Chancellor at the request of either Faculty.
- (2) That there shall be a Registrar of Victoria University who shall also be the Secretary of the Senate and who shall be the official custodian of all records and papers of the Senate, including the lists of graduates and holders of diplomas, as well as the records of examination results and of the standing of students in each Faculty. He shall also conduct the elections of the representatives of the Graduates upon the Board of Regents, and the Senate of Victoria University.

1. The degree of Doctor of Theology (theologiae doctor) will be granted in course upon the conditions hereinafter set forth.
2. To be enrolled a candidate must:
 - (1) be a graduate in Arts of a university of recognized standing;
 - (2) hold the Bachelor's degree in divinity from this university or have equivalent standing;
 - (3) show by preliminary examination that he has a broad and adequate knowledge of the fundamental theological disciplines;
 - (4) show by preliminary examination that he has a working knowledge of such languages (Hebrew, Greek, Latin, French, German) and of such parts of history and philosophy as may be necessary in his field of special study.
3. When he is enrolled the candidate shall choose a field of special study in one of the following departments: (1) The Bible; (2) The History of the Church, including the History of Doctrine; (3) Theology (Christian Doctrine, the Philosophy and Psychology and History of Religion, and Christian Ethics.) The field of special study must be approved by the department concerned and by the Committee on Advanced Studies.
4. After enrollment the candidate shall carry on his work for not less than three years, two years of which must be intra-mural.
5. The candidate shall work under the direction and to the satisfaction of the department of his special study. His plan of study must be coherent and the studies comprised in it of advanced grade. It may embrace work with other professors than those of Emmanuel College. The whole plan must have the approval of the Committee on Advanced Studies. The candidate must pass such examinations as the department, working in conjunction with the Committee on Advanced Studies, may require.
6. The candidate shall prepare a thesis on a subject within his field of special study. The subject of the thesis must be approved by the department concerned and by the Committee on Advanced Studies not later than the end of the first year of work for the degree. The thesis must rest upon independent investigation and show constructive ability. When completed the thesis shall be read by two or more professors of Emmanuel College who shall report to the Council an estimate of its merit; it shall also be read by one who is not a professor of Emmanuel College and he too shall submit a report to the Council. Before the degree is conferred the candidate must pass an oral examination on the subject of the thesis.

When he is enrolled the candidate shall choose a field of special study in one of the following departments: (1) The Bible; (2) The History of the Church, including the History of Doctrine; (3) Theology (Christian Doctrine, the Philosophy and Psychology and History of Religion, and Christian Ethics). The field of special study must be approved by the department concerned and by the Committee on Advanced Studies.
4. After enrollment the candidate shall carry on his work for not less than six years. (In consideration of intramural work this period may be shortened to five years).
5. The candidate shall work under the direction and to the satisfaction of the department of his special study. His plan of study must be coherent and the studies comprised in it of advanced grade. It may embrace work with other professors than those of Emmanuel College. The whole plan must have the approval of the Committee on Advanced Studies. The candidate must pass such examinations as the department, working in conjunction with the Committee on Advanced Studies, may require.
6. The candidate shall prepare a thesis on a subject within his field of special study. The subject of the thesis must be approved by the department concerned and by the Committee on Advanced Studies not later than the end of the second year of work for the degree. The thesis must show mastery in a wide field of theological inquiry and give evidence of constructive ability. It shall not be presented till nine full years have elapsed after the completion of the ordinary course. When completed the thesis shall be read by two or more professors of Emmanuel College who shall report to the Council an estimate of its merit; it shall also be read by one who is not a professor of Emmanuel College and he too shall submit a report to the Council. Before the degree is conferred the candidate must pass an oral examination on the subject of the thesis.

Regulations for award of the Carty Scholarships

(To be awarded for the first time according to the results of the Arts Examinations...1931)

- (1) A scholarship of the value of \$250 to be called the Mary Ellen Carty Scholarship the gift of Miss Martha

Carty, to be awarded at the end of the second year of the Arts Course, on the basis of the combined marks of the first and second year examinations, to the student who is the daughter of a foreign missionary standing highest in any course, Pass or Honour, provided that she has obtained not less than Second Class Honours or Grade B standing, in the second year examinations.

- (2) A scholarship of the value of \$250 to be called the Mary Ellen Carty scholarship. The gift of Miss Martha Carty, to be awarded at the end of the third year of the Arts Course, on the basis of the third year examinations, to the student who is the daughter of a foreign missionary standing highest in any course, Pass or Honour, provided that she has obtained not lower than Second Class Honours or Grade B standing, at the third year examinations.

- (3) In the event of there being no candidate eligible for one or both of these scholarships, an award may be made at the discretion of the senate, first preference being given to a student who is a missionary's daughter, or another year than that to which the scholarship is assigned and who fulfils the academic requirements; and second preference being given to a woman student in residence not a missionary's daughter, who fulfils the academic requirements and is of the same year as that to which the scholarship is assigned.

Record of resolution on death of Prof. Potter

It was moved by Professor Davidson and Professor Michael that the following resolution regarding the death of Professor W. A. Potter be entered in the minutes of the Senate, and that a copy be sent to Mrs. Potter and to each of his two daughters.

That the Senate record its deep sense of the loss sustained by the University in the death in Edinburgh on March the second of the Reverend Professor William Arthur Potter, M.A., B.D. Professor Potter had served as a member of the staff of Victoria College in the department of Oriental Languages and of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis for nearly twenty years and had gained the confidence and respect of his colleagues and students. His work as a teacher of languages, history, and archaeology was of a high order, and was marked by seriousness, and continuous effort for the direction of his students and the increase of their interest in the subjects taught. He himself was a student whose industry

never slackened and who was persistent to the end in the effort to explore more widely the fields of study of his department and to equip himself more perfectly for his work of teaching. A year ago he was given leave of absence for a year of travel and study in Great Britain, Germany, Syria, and Palestine, the results of which, we had hoped, would add to his already highly efficient service as a teacher. He has left us an encouraging and inspiring memory of high ideals, warm enthusiasms, and great loyalties to the colleges and the church, which he served with untiring and unselfish devotion.

Professor Potter graduated in Arts from Victoria College, with first class honours in Oriental Languages, in the year 1900, and in Divinity in 1909. He was ordained to the ministry of the Methodist Church in 1900, and served in the pastoral charges of Chapleau, Aglinton (Toronto), Weston, and Shelburne. In 1912 he was called to the staff of instruction in Victoria College faculties of Arts and Theology, in which he served as Lecturer until 1919, as Associate Professor until 1925, and since that year as Professor. He also rendered valuable service as Secretary of the faculty of Theology from 1913 to 1927..

"The late Norman Slater, who died on August 17th, 1931, was a resident of Hamilton, where he carried on a rapidly growing manufacturing business. In his own City he took a leading part in the building of the new Melrose Church and in the campaign for providing buildings for McMaster University in Hamilton. Yet he was more than a citizen of Hamilton, -- he was a citizen of the Dominion. By his work in the Canadian Manufacturers Association, the National I.M.C.A. Council, the Executive Committee of the General Council of the United Church of Canada, and the Board of Regents of Victoria University, he had a large share in the industrial, educational and religious life of Canada. The distinctive thing, however, about Mr. Slater, was not what he did, or what he had, but what he was. He trusted his fellow

workers, draw the best from them, and developed their capacity to accept responsibility. A few weeks after his death his employees erected a tablet in his memory, with the inscription, "A just employer and a true friend." This one incident is a tribute to Mr. Slater as an employer, but in all the other relationships of life he held to the highest standards. The Senate of Victoria University feels keenly the loss it has sustained, expresses its deepest sympathy to Mrs. Slater and Miss Slater, and directs that a copy of this memorial be sent to Mrs. Slater, and to Miss Slater who is a student at Victoria University."

"The Senate of Victoria University records its sense of loss through the death of the Reverend John MacDonald Duncan. He was a son of the Reverend John Duncan, long an esteemed minister in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. He was educated at the University of Toronto, where he sat, an eager learner, at the feet of the late George Paxton Young. After taking his degree he assisted his professor for some time in the Department of Philosophy. Then he studied theology at Knox College. He had two pastorates, at Tottenham and Boston, and at Woodville. But the major portion of his life (nearly thirty years) was devoted to the preparation and editing of Sunday School Helps, first for the Presbyterian Church, then for the United Church. He retired in 1929 at the age of seventy.

"Those who knew him will cherish his memory,-- the integrity of his mind, his kind and gentle spirit, his affection for children and his delight in them, his loyalty to his friends, and the heart that bound him to his fellow-men in faith and hope and love.

"From the days of his association with Professor Young, his interest in University and Theological College never slackened. Knox College has perhaps never had among its friends one who understood better or gave it more of his time and thought. This devotion, quickened by the Union of 1925, he carried over to Emmanuel College and Victoria University. In his passing this institution has lost a steadfast and an understanding friend."

"The Senate of Victoria University records its sense of loss sustained in the unexpected death of the Rev. John Walker Macmillan, B.A., D.D., Professor of Sociology.

"Dr. Macmillan was born at Mount Forest on September 25, 1868; he died at Toronto on April 16, 1932. He graduated from University College in 1888, and from Knox College in 1891. In the next twenty-five years he ministered to four congregations, in

Vancouver, Lindsay, Winnipeg and Halifax. Then he was professor of Christian Ethics and Practical Theology in Manitoba College for three years; and for the last thirteen years he has been professor of Sociology in this place. During the last twenty years he has served on several important public commissions; and for eleven years he has been chairman of the Minimum Wage Board of Ontario; in 1909 Manitoba College gave him the degree of D.D.

"His death was a loss alike to the University and to the province, for he was able to translate his conception of social rights and duties into practical administrations, and also to carry over into the classroom a great wealth of personal experience. His services were ever at the disposal of College and Church, and his judgments were sane and helpful. He enjoyed the abiding confidence and love of his colleagues, and his memory will long be treasured within these halls."

Professor Michael, on behalf of the committee appointed, presented a Resolution concerning the late Principal Gandier, as follows:

Resolution concerning the late Principal Gandier

"We desire as a Senate to place on record our sense of the loss sustained by Victoria University and in particular by Emmanuel College through the death of the Rev. Alfred Gandier, M.A., D.D., LL.D. His long experience both as pastor and college principal, his native sagacity and his Christian character gave to his counsel at all times a maturity and a quite exceptional value. We recall his distinguished career as a student, first in the Kingston Collegiate Institute and afterwards in Queen's University and in Edinburgh; we remind ourselves also that following his ordination to the ministry in 1889 there came three pastorates in which he proved himself to be a

devoted shepherd of the people committed to his care. He was pastor of Brampton Presbyterian Church from 1889 to 1893, of the Fort Massey Church in Halifax from 1893 to 1900, and of St. James Square Church, Toronto, from 1901 to 1908. In the last mentioned year began his long and distinguished service, extending over 24 years, as Principal and Professor of Pastoral Theology, Christian Missions, and English Bible, first in Knox College and subsequently in Emmanuel College. For a long period of years he was Chairman of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; nor did his interest in foreign missionary work flag in the least when he relinquished that responsible post. The place he had come to occupy in the esteem and regard of the Presbyterian Church was made manifest by his election as Moderator of the General Assembly in 1928. He died suddenly and unexpectedly on June 13, 1932.

"Dr. Gandier had the satisfaction of accomplishing much in the course of his life. He was the virtual founder of our Mission in Korea, and was a prominent and influential figure in the Union of the churches in our own land. The collecting of five million dollars immediately after the war was largely the outcome of his enthusiasm and faith.

"His chief monument, however, is to be seen in the two Colleges which he did so much to build. Almost single-handed he collected half-a-million dollars to build Knox College, and his energy and resolution were prime factors in the building of Emmanuel College. But his heart was in the training and well-being of the men who came to these Colleges. His pastoral diligence was no whit less evident in the Colleges than in his churches. From first to last his career was a notable one. We mourn the loss of one who accomplished great things. The memory of his character and his achievements will be an inspiration for many years to come."

It was moved by Professor Michael and Dow that this Resolution be incorporated in the minutes of the Senate, and a copy sent to Mrs. Gandier. Carried by standing vote.

The Registrar presented a case to the Senate of a graduate student who, during his undergraduate course, had held the Trick Scholarship for three years, and, since graduation, had decided not to enter the ministry. As the student himself had made enquiry to the Chancellor as to his obligation in respect to the scholarship money which he had received, the Senate was asked to make a recommendation regarding this case and similar cases which may arise in the future.

"Andrew James Bell was born at Janesville, near Ottawa, May 12, 1856, the son of George Bell and Jessie Fleming. He was educated at the Ottawa Grammar School and University College, Toronto, from which he graduated in 1878 with a double First in Classics and Moderna and the Prince's Prize. After three years of teaching in St. Thomas Collegiate Institute, he joined the staff of Victoria University, then situated in Cobourg. From 1886 to 1889 he was on leave of absence studying in the University of Breslau, Germany, where he received the degree of Ph.D. From 1900 until 1922, along with his Professorship of Latin in Victoria College, he held the post of Professor of Comparative Philology in the University of Toronto. In preparation for this post he spent three semesters in the University of Leipzig. Upon his retirement he received from the Carnegie Foundation a special pension as a recognition of eminent scholarship. In 1924 he published a substantial volume entitled "The Latin Dual and Poetic Diction", which was well received abroad. He died December 24, 1932, after enjoying six years of well-earned leisure."

"Dr. Bell was predestined for a brilliant academic career. He was familiar with a considerable body of fine English literature before his secondary education was begun. In the Ottawa Grammar School he discovered in himself a marked preference for literary and linguistic studies as against mathematics and natural science. At the University of Toronto he read widely and profitably while maintaining a high standing in two Honour Courses. The opportunity of entering upon college work providentially offered him in 1881, swayed his latent passion for philological studies, which were then enjoying great vogue. His three years of study in Breslau equipped him far beyond the needs of the position he occupied, but this splendid equipment stood the College in good stead in 1892, when it began the great experiment of Federation in the University of Toronto. This prestige, which Dr. Bell's reputation had already earned, was further enhanced by subsequent study in Leipzig, which made available to his students the finest scholarship of the continent of Europe. It was thus his singular privilege to win for his College an undeniable respect at a most critical time. He also put the College deeply in his debt by the extraordinary length of his service, his boundless diligence, and increasing self-sacrifice. The affectionate gratitude of thousands of students will keep his memory green for many a year, but a residue of good that accrued from his life will long survive his generation.

"His colleagues recall him with affection and esteem and wish to assure Mrs. Bell of their deep and cordial feelings."

In the death of Frederick Newton Gisborne Starr, Victoria University has lost one of its most distinguished alumni. Born in a Methodist parsonage, the youngest of the six sons of Joseph Herbert Starr and his wife, Susan Hawkins Evans, his enterprise and ability enabled him to overcome all difficulties and to proceed through the medical course then offered in this university. He graduated in 1889 at the age of twenty-two, proceeded to Europe for extensive study abroad, and returned to Ontario, rapidly to achieve a reputation as one of the foremost surgeons of the continent, while at the same time taking a prominent part in the several medical associations, Canadian, American and British.

But in the press of varied duties and responsibilities he could always find time to be of service to this university. For thirty-two years he was a member of the Senate and for nineteen years a member of the Board of Regents. The Senate of Victoria University wishes to record its appreciation of the service rendered this University by the late Alfred Ernest Ames throughout the period of thirty-six years during which he served as a member of the Board of Regents and the Senate.

Mr. Ames was one of a group of younger members of the Board whose connection with the college began in the period when the issue of federation was still uncertain. The business ability of these men, the generous financial assistance they gave and enlisted, together with the devotion of an able President and professoriate, laid the foundation of the success of what to many at the time seemed a doubtful or even mistaken experiment. Mr. Ames was not an alumnus, but he had his roots deep in the soil from which Victoria sprang. He was the son of the Rev. William Ames and Hesibah Coleman Whitelaw, both of Wesleyan Methodist stock replanted more than a century ago in Upper Canada. His father was a student in Cobourg in the years of 1846 and 1846, his mother the daughter of a physician. He himself entered a bank at an early age and rapidly achieved business success. His interests were wide and varied. To a mind alert and suspicious was added determination, good taste and loyalty. His work on finance committees, and particularly his work in connection with the building fund, will be gratefully remembered, but not less, the terseness and finish of his too infrequent public addresses. We acknowledge a large life, lived consistently and without ostentation.

The Senate of Victoria University wishes to pay grateful tribute to the memory of Professor Charles Karl Anger. For more than thirty years, as student, teacher and officer, he was an active and devoted member of this society; and when the connection was broken at the very height of his powers and usefulness, it could be said of him that the true spirit of Victoria had found expression and himself disciplined, as were so many of his time, by a period of teaching in a country school, he entered a college with an interest already awakened in literature and a capacity for friendship which gave a rich reward to his four student years. After five years in the United States, three in teaching and two in graduate work at Chicago, he returned to his college home as lecturer in English. For a time his duties gave him a very heavy assignment of essays, and here his interest in others and his fine sense of values made useful and attractive a task which to many would have been drudgery. His main interests were in sixteenth and eighteenth century literature and his lectures in these chosen fields exhibited the solid scholarship and balanced judgment so characteristic of the man. When he became Registrar and Secretary of the Senate, he continued his teaching, but his new duties gave him a large place in the councils of the University as well as bringing him into close touch with an even greater number of students as advisor and friend. The last thirteen years of his life were thus spent with increasing responsibilities and influence in Victoria and the University of Toronto, and in the midst of an ever greater number of those who were glad to call him friend. Such a man might truly say "non omnis moriar", for the qualities which he built into the college and into the lives of its graduates will endure beyond the reckoning of mortal mind.

LEAVES

ALL YEARS

1. Students going out expecting to return later than 7.30 p.m. sign the leave book in full and record the time of their return as directed.
2. Leave cards must be signed if the student returns after 10.30 p.m. on week nights and after 11.30 p.m. on Sunday.
3. Sunday night leave expires at 11.30 p.m. By permission of the Don, this leave may be extended for those returning from out of town after 11.30.
4. Students must ask permission of a Don:
 - (a) to participate in the following activities; go driving outside the city, drive home, use "drive yourself" cars, go boating, tobogganing, skiing or flying, to attend specified dance halls.
 - (b) to attend dances not held in Victoria College buildings.
 - (c) to be absent overnight or during week ends, including visits at home.
5. Students must ask the Dean for extension of leave. Leaves may be extended until 1.30 for approved dance halls, or later for chaperoned dances.
6. In asking permission from Dean or Don, the student must of her own accord give full particulars as to chaperonage.
7. Except under unusual circumstances, for first and second year students, a night spent out of residence will be considered a 12.30 leave unless it be on Saturday night and Sunday night of a week-end leave. First and second year students may not remain out overnight after a party which involves an extension of a 12.30 leave unless staying in the home where the party is held.

FIRST YEAR

- (a) Students of the first year must ask permission to be absent from the residence after 10.30 p.m. If a Don is not available, a senior may grant permissions for activities other than those stated in A.4.
- (b) One 11.30 leave a week, averaged, and one 12.30 leave a week, averaged, will be granted to students of the first year.
- (c) Six 12.30 leaves may be extended by permission of the Dean, on the day preceding the leave.

A letter was read from Chancellor Wallace, announcing the acceptance by the Board of Regents of gifts for the establishment of new scholarships, prizes and lectures, and asking the Senate to determine the conditions under which they are to be administered. A scholarship in Emmanuel College established by bequest of the late Rev. Dr. Hugh T. Crossley. The Senate confirmed the terms of award as set forth in the following clauses of Dr. Crossley's will:

"I further desire and direct my executors to set apart \$3000.00 to constitute a fund to be known as the "Crossley Memorial Fund", the income from which is to go towards the support of a student in training for the ministry at Emmanuel College, Toronto, to pay or help pay his salary as student pastor in some down town Toronto church. So long as my namesake Rev. E. Crossley Hunter is minister at Carlton Street United Church, Toronto, it will be my pleasure to have the student stationed there.

"The appointment of this student shall be in the hands of a committee consisting of the President of Toronto Conference of the United Church, the Dean of Theology of Emmanuel College, and Rev. E. Crossley Hunter. If my executors desire, they are to be at liberty to transfer the \$3000.00 or the securities representing that sum, to any committee designated by the Toronto Central Presbytery of the United Church".

Principal Davidson reported that the Executors have, with the consent of the Toronto Centre Presbytery, transferred the sum of \$3000.00 to the Treasurer of Victoria University.

A gift of \$160 every three years from Mrs. Alfred Gandler for the establishment of a lecture or lectures to be given triennially in Emmanuel College, beginning in 1935-36. The Senate confirmed the conditions set forth in the following excerpt from a letter of Mrs. Gandler to the Principal of Emmanuel College:

the delivery in Emmanuel College of a lecture or lectures on Foreign Missions, once in every three years, by some person who by reason of special knowledge or of eminent service, may be expected to create a clearer understanding of the Great Commission and deeper devotion among the students and graduates of the College to this essential activity of the Church.

These lectures to be called The Principal Alfred Gandar Lectures on Foreign Missions.

The Lecturer to be chosen by the Council of Emmanuel College."

The Francis Huston Wallace Prize of \$50, in books, the gift of his children, in memory of Professor F.H. Wallace, former Dean of the Faculty of Theology of Victoria University. The Senate confirmed the recommendation of the Council of Emmanuel College, which was taken in accordance with the wish of the donors that this prize be awarded annually to the student standing first in the class of New Testament in the third year.

An increase of the Joy Wallace prize from \$15 to \$20.00 was also announced, and the Senate concurred in the recommendation of the Emmanuel College Council that this prize be awarded to the student standing second in New Testament of the third year.

A gift of \$1800 from the Victoria College Union to endow the Joseph William Binning Scholarship. No further action was needed in this case, as the Senate had already been informed of the gift and had at its meeting of April 5th referred the question of terms of award to the Victoria College Council.

Moved by Professor Bennett, seconded by Mr. Gundy, that this report of the Scholarship and Bursary Committee be received and adopted.

A letter was read from Mr. N. E. Riston, Brantford, Ontario, winner of the Flavell Scholarship in Classics at the 1935 Matriculation examinations, in which he asked that he might be permitted to postpone his entrance to Victoria College for two years. He stated that he had employment at the present time, and that his help was needed at home, but that in two years he hoped to have improved his position sufficiently to make a College course possible. After general discussion it was moved by Professor Langford, seconded by Mr. Gundy, that a postponement of one year in the use of the scholarship be granted now, and that Mr. Riston be urged to keep up his studies and apply again next year if at that time he should still find himself unable to enter college.

The secretary announced that the second General Proficiency Scholarship, which is of the value of \$150.00 in cash and four years free tuition, had been voluntarily relinquished by the winner, Mr. C. G. Sanderson, who had decided to enter the straight course in Medicine instead of Biological and Medical Sciences. He therefore presented the recommendation of the Scholarship and Bursary Committee that this scholarship should be divided into two special scholarships, each carrying an award of \$75 cash and half tuition for four years, and that these special scholarships be awarded to Mr. W. Christopherson and Mr. F. J. Beharriell, who were runners-up in their respective divisions of Classics and Moderns.

Revision of Hamilton Fisk Bigger Scholarships

The Secretary presented a verbal report from the Bursar concerning the income now received from the Hamilton Fisk Bigger endowment for scholarships. In view of the fact that for the present year only \$270.00 is to be expected from this fund he pointed out that some curtailment of the scholarships offered becomes necessary. After some discussion it was moved by Professor Bennett, seconded by Principal Brown, that the Hamilton Fisk Bigger Matriculation Scholarship be withdrawn.

It was then moved by Principal Brown, seconded by Professor de Beaumont, that the present arrangement of the remaining Hamilton Fisk Bigger Scholarships be discontinued, and that the Senate set up three scholarships for which the available cash shall be divided equally, and that a request be forwarded to the Board of Regents that they will attach to each of these three scholarships a sufficient remission of tuition fees to bring the value of the scholarship to \$200.00; that if the Board of Regents gives its assent to this request these scholarships be awarded at the discretion of the Senate to students who take exceptionally high standing at the First Year examinations.

Matriculation Scholarships Gen. Proficiency Requirement

The Secretary raised the question of the desirability of changing the basis of award in the case of General Proficiency Scholarships at matriculation from eight to nine papers. He pointed out that the eight paper rule at present in force goes back to a time when admittance to some honour courses of the University could be secured on eight papers but that the present requirements are uniform at nine papers for all courses. Moved by Professor Sissons, seconded by Professor Surerus, that the basis of award be changed to nine papers.

Since in the discussion of the foregoing motion it had been pointed out that students choosing certain combinations of subjects for Honour Matriculation would be obliged to write ten papers,

the question of how best to compute their standing under the rule adopted above was, on motion of Principal Brown, seconded by Professor Sissons, referred to a Committee consisting of the Registrar, Mr. F. H. Clarke, Professor de Beaumont and Professor Surerus.

The Secretary presented a report from the Council of Victoria College recommending the following wording for the terms of award of the Joseph William Binning Scholarship:

"The Joseph William Binning Scholarship, of the value of \$72.00, the gift of the Victoria College Union, is named in memory of a former officer of that society who died shortly after graduation. It is awarded annually to a student entering the graduating year, who has maintained a high scholastic standing throughout his course while at the same time taking a prominent part in organized student activities."

Moved by Professor Sissons, seconded by Principal Brown, that these terms be approved but that the announcement of the value of the scholarship be amended to read "the annual income on a capital sum of \$1,800.00".

Extra-mural B.D. degree

(4) Do additional work in connection with at least six different courses, not more than one of which shall be with any one professor. The selection made must have the approval of the staff. This additional work shall ordinarily be connected with the following courses: Old Testament 1a; New Testament 1 or New Testament 2; Church History 1 or Church History 2; Philosophy of Religion 1; Psychology of Religion; Systematic Theology 3; Religious Pedagogy 2.

But if a candidate does the additional work extra-murally the staff of Emmanuel College shall have power to modify the requirement of the preceding paragraph, provided only that the work

shall be done with not less than two professors, and that it be equivalent altogether to not less than four lecture-courses of two hours a week each.
At least second-class standing must be attained in these additional courses.

On motion of Principal Davidson, seconded by Professor Michael, this recommendation was approved.

With profound sorrow the Senate of Victoria University records upon its minutes the death of its beloved and distinguished alumnus, Dr. George Herbert Locke, B.A., '93. It mourns the passing of a loyal member who combined with gracious manners and sparkling wit a genuine dignity, force of character and outstanding helpfulness. It also recalls with deep satisfaction the rapid and unbroken series of merited promotions and the high accomplishment that characterized his long and brilliant career. In the brief space of thirteen years following his

attainment of the B. A. degree he was a graduate student in the University of Chicago, twice a member of its staff, a member of the staff of Harvard University, a successful executive with a large publishing house, and finally principal of MacDonald Institute, Quebec.

It is, however, his thirty years of service as Chief Librarian of the City of Toronto that the Senate recalls as his outstanding accomplishment. It is particularly gratifying to the members of the Senate and to friends of Victoria University everywhere that its first graduating class in Toronto should have been able to furnish to the city an official capable of raising the service rendered by its Public Library System to a standard of excellence regarded with admiration throughout the world. While this achievement was fortunately acknowledged during his lifetime, it must also be gratefully conceded that the equipment and organization erected by him will carry the imprint of his ideals and personality to the far distant future. His true monument, therefore, is the institution promoted by him to such efficiency, but his memory will also be cherished in the happy and affectionate recollections of his innumerable friends.

The Senate recalls with particular gratitude his loyal devotion to the interests of his Alma Mater as an alumnus, and for the past twenty years as a member of the Board of Regents, and especially his incomparable services to the College Library, which not only benefitted continually through his expert advice and counsel as a member of the Library Board, but also through his influence was permitted to share in the generous gift of the Carnegie Corporation from 1936 to 1938. With these feelings of pride and gratitude is mingled the confident faith that his magnificent example has been and will long continue to be an inspiration and a stimulus to others to give generously of themselves for the furtherance of such noble and worthy causes as those for which he stood. Along with this grateful testimony to the long and valued services of Dr. Locke, the Senate extends to his widow, to her relatives and to the relatives of her lamented husband its profound and heartfelt sympathy.

Senate's Resolution regarding Dr. F. W. Merchant, copy of which has been sent to his daughters, the Misses Christine and Jean Merchant: "Integer vires, acclerisque purus"
When Francis W. Merchant died the University lost a distinguished alumnus, whose passing this Senate records with deep regret. He died in the fulness of years and of honour, after a life faithfully spent in the cause of education in Ontario. His career has probably not been paralleled in the varied forms of education in which he engaged with marked success.

His father was French, his mother Scotch. He was educated in Albert Grammar School, and in Albert University, where he took his B.A. degree in 1876, and his M.A. in 1880. After teaching in public schools for a short time he entered upon his work in the

secondary schools, where he was to prove himself one of the great schoolmasters. He served as headmaster in Fort Dover and Aylmer collegiate institutes. Beginning in a very small school, he ended this stage of his work in what was the largest at that time. When the London Normal School was organized he became its principal, a position he held for eight years. While in London he also delivered lectures on Physics in the University of Western Ontario. During busy years he found time, too, to write text books on Physical Science.

In 1908 he came to Toronto to join the provincial Department of Education as Chief Inspector of Public and Separate Schools and Inspector of Normal Schools. In 1910 he was made a Commissioner to look into the matter of bilingual schools in Ontario. He performed this delicate task with tact, patience and good judgment. In 1911 he was appointed Director of Industrial and Technical Education. He prepared himself for this important work by making a survey of what was being done in other countries. When Dr. John Seath, Superintendent of Education, died, he succeeded with the title changed to Director of Education. Finally on retirement from active duty he was made special adviser to the Department, an appointment which shows the high value placed on his mature judgment. His fellow teachers had honoured him in earlier years by electing him president of the Ontario Educational Association. He was a member of the Board of Governors of the University of Toronto, of the Senate of Knox College, and also of this Senate, where he represented Albert College since 1898.

He is gone.

"Gone; but nothing can bereave him
Of the force he made his own
Being here."

He was able, earnest, sincere, progressive and forcible. In the successive stages of his career his task was ever well done, and his reputation enhanced. His personality and his achievements throughout a long life were such that the contemplation of them cannot but bring comfort to his friends and family.

Changes in the composition of the Senate of the University of Toronto

The Senate of the University of Toronto proposes the following changes in its composition, in the matter of representation of graduates, to provide for the representation of groups not already represented and to change the number of representatives in certain groups.

Under Section 46(r) of the University Act, the Senate has power, subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, to make such changes, provided that no change in the composition of the Senate is made which affects the rights of representation thereon of a federated university or a federated college, unless the same is assented to by the federated university or college affected by the change.

The Senate of Victoria University is asked to give its assent to the following changes:

- (1) Groups of graduates not now represented on the Senate: Household Science - 1, Education - 1, Veterinary Science - 1, Pharmacy - 2.

- (2) Increase in the number of representatives in the following groups: Medicine - from 5 to 8, Applied Science and Engineering - from 4 to 6, Dentistry - from 3 to 5, and Agriculture - from 2 to 3.
- (3) Present representation of the Faculty of Arts: University College - 12, Victoria College - 5, Trinity College - 5, St. Michael's College - 5, Non-collegiate B.A.'s - 1, Non-collegiate M.A.'s and Ph.D.'s - 1.

The Scholarship and Bursary Committee has had under consideration the serious decrease which occurred this year in the number of applicants for matriculation scholarships in Victoria College, and begs to present the following recommendations:

(1) that an understanding should be sought with the other Colleges of the University in respect of the number and value of matriculation scholarships which each should seek to maintain;

(2) that immediate steps should be taken to bring the number and value of Victoria College matriculation scholarships into such a ratio to those of the other Colleges as will give this College a fair opportunity of attracting the best scholars in the province;

(3) that such increase in the number and value of Victoria College scholarships as may be found necessary should be sought through new gifts, but that as a temporary measure the Senate should ask permission of the Board of Regents to set apart from Bursary Funds a sum sufficient to raise as many as six of the existing Moses Henry Atkins Scholarships to a value of \$200 or \$300 each;

(4) that in seeking new gifts a special effort should be made to secure county or rural scholarships restricted to areas in various parts of the province;

(5) that the administrators of the Leonard Foundation be approached in order to see whether Victoria College might be added to the list of Colleges whose students are eligible for its bursary awards.

On motion of Professor Bennett, seconded by Mrs. Duff, the Senate adopted this report and ordered that copies of it should be sent to the Chancellor of Victoria University and the Principal of Victoria College, with the request that they, in consultation with the Scholarship and Bursary Committee, should take steps to give effect to its provisions.

The Chancellor's letter explained that the grant from the Board of Christian Education is no longer made to individual students but is now paid to Victoria College, which is free to determine the amount given to Victoria student on the basis of his financial need and his promise of usefulness in the ministry.

On motion of Principal Brown, seconded by Miss Skinner, it was resolved that these funds from the Board of Christian Education be placed at the disposal of the Scholarship and Bursary Committee to administer for the benefit of Church Students in Arts.

Principal Brown made an informal announcement to the Senate of new scholarships which have been donated by Dr. Marion Billiard in honour of her father and by Miss Ina H. Principal Brown stated that he was satisfied that the interests of Victoria College in respect of University Extension courses would not be prejudiced if the Senate should give assent to the present proposals.

The report of the Scholarship and Bursary Committee on Matriculation Scholarships came up for further consideration. Principal Brown reviewed the previous discussion and explained certain modifications of the report which had been made by the Committee since the last meeting of the Senate.

A resolution in the following terms was moved by Principal Brown, seconded by Professor Sissons, and passed by unanimous vote: That the Senate request the Board of Regents to authorize the increase of Victoria College Matriculation Scholarships carrying free tuition to a number not to exceed twenty-four, this being in accord with the policy adopted in the resolution of the Board of Regents of June 8th, 1937. For the present year it is the opinion of the Senate that approximately twenty scholarships should be offered.

A tentative plan for the arrangement of twenty matriculation scholarships, to be provided this year if possible and in any case as soon as funds permit, was then presented by the Secretary in the following form:

1. General Proficiency (best nine papers)
Four scholarships each with cash value of \$300

2. Latin and Greek

French and German

English and two foreign languages

Mathematics (Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry and Problems)

Science (Physics and Chemistry, or Botany and Zoology)

In each of the above combinations of subjects:

One scholarship with cash value of \$250

One scholarship with cash value of \$150 or \$125

3. Special Proficiency

Six scholarships, three with cash value of \$250 each and three with cash value of \$150 or \$125 each, to be awarded for special proficiency in the particular group of subjects specified for admission to the Honour Course which the candidate intends to pursue in the University. Preference will be given to candidates seeking admission to Honour Courses such as Social and Philosophical Studies (leading to Modern History, Philosophy, Political Science and Economics, Psychology and Sociology), Law, and Commerce and Finance, which do not in the University emphasize those subjects in which the Moses Henry Atkins Scholarships are offered.

It is proposed that the Board of Regents shall be asked to attach free tuition (on the usual scholarship conditions) to all new scholarships included in the above, but that in the case of students entering Commerce and Finance the exemption shall apply only to the portion of the tuition fee which is payable to Victoria College.

In the discussion which followed some objection was taken to the term, "Special Proficiency", and it was urged by several speakers that the meaning of the paragraph under this heading should be stated in clearer terms. For these reasons, and in order not to fix the number and value of scholarships for this year until the latest possible time for sending out Dr. announcements, it was moved by Principal Brown, seconded by Dr. Baker, that the report be accepted in principle and referred to the Scholarship and Bursary Committee for the working out of details.

Carried unanimously.

The George Dennis Morse Scholarship having been in the past assigned to the third year of the English and History Course, which disappears from the Calendar after the present session, it was moved by Professor Surveys, seconded by Mr. Woodger, that for 1939 and until further action is taken by the Senate this scholarship shall be awarded to the Victoria College student judged to have the best standing in first class honours at the Third Year examinations in the following

group of Courses: English Language and Literature, Modern History, Modern Languages. This arrangement was felt to carry out as fully as is now possible the wish of the donor that the award should be given in the field of English and History with Moderns Option.

Professor Sissons presented a report from the special committee appointed to consider the question of the possible inequalities inherent in the present method of granting medals at graduation. With some slight emendations which were accepted by Professor Sissons on behalf of the Committee the report was, on his motion, seconded by Professor Sururus, adopted in the following terms:

1. The condition attached to the awarding of Regents' Gold Medals, that the recipient must be first in the University of Toronto, should be removed, and the awarding of these should be made uniform with the awarding of the endowed medals.

2. The honour courses should be grouped for purposes of medal awards as follows:

- (A) Groups to which an endowed medal has been assigned,
- 1) Classics, Latin (French or Greek) The Edward Wilson
 - 11) Modern Languages The MacLaren
 - 111) Philosophy, Philosophy (E. or H.) The Sanford
 - iv) Political Science and Economics, The Adma Gold and Silver
 - v) Science The Cox
 - vi) Commerce and Finance The Hurdle
- (B) Groups to which no endowed medal has been assigned,
- 1) Mathematics and Physics, Physics and Chemistry, Physics and Geology
 - 11) Psychology, Sociology
 - 111) Oriental Languages, Greek and Hebrew, Hebrew and Ancient History
 - iv) Fine Art, Music
 - v) Household Economics, Food Chemistry.

3. A Regents' Gold Medal may be awarded in the General Course.
4. After 1939, the Jolliffe Gold Medal should be assigned to the course in English Language and Literature.
5. Where an endowed medal has been assigned to a group, it should be awarded in the course first named, provided there is in that course a Victoria College student obtaining first class honours. In groups to which no endowed medal has been assigned, a Regents' Gold Medal should be awarded to the student judged to have the best standing in first class honours in the group.
6. A second gold medal may be awarded in a group, at the discretion of the Senate, but a second gold medal should not be awarded in the same course. An S. H. James Silver Medal may be awarded to the student standing second in any group.
7. The Senate should from time to time satisfy itself that the enrolment in the course or groups of courses in which medals are awarded is sufficient to justify the continuance of such medal awards.
8. In the case of non-endowed medals, it should be at the discretion of the Senate each year, to determine whether any award should be made.

Continuing the discussion on the award of medals, Principal Brown moved, seconded by Professor de Beaumont, that the Senate should request the Board of Regents to consider the possibility of establishing a Gold Medal in the name of Mrs. Massey Treble, for award to the Victoria College student

On motion duly seconded and carried, it was approved that Principal Davidson be asked to present the candidates for the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa), and that Professor Couland be asked to present the five candidates for the Bachelor of Divinity degree.

Professor Couland reported that the statement of the revised course for the degree of Doctor of Theology, with recommendations accompanying it, which was read at the last meeting of the Senate, had received the approval of the Emmanuel College Council at their meeting of April 25th.

It was moved by Professor Couland, seconded by Professor Line, that the revised course for advanced degrees in divinity be approved as follows:

Advanced Degrees in Divinity

Whereas the Executive Committee of the Council of Emmanuel College desires that the degree of doctor of divinity be given honoris causa only, and that the degree of doctor of theology be given to those who complete the course that now leads to the degree of doctor of divinity as well as to those who complete the course that now leads to the degree of doctor of theology; and whereas it is expedient that this should be done;

Therefore this Senate enacts as follows:

I. That no more candidates shall be admitted to the course leading to the degree of doctor of divinity; and that the course be discontinued on and after June 30, 1944, or at a time before that date when it shall be found that no candidates are enrolled in it.

II. That the statute establishing the degree of doctor of theology be amended so that it shall read as follows:

THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF THEOLOGY

- The degree of Doctor of Theology will be granted in course upon the conditions hereinafter set forth.
- To be enrolled a candidate must:
 - be a graduate in Arts of a University of recognized standing.
 - have received the bachelor's degree in Divinity with distinction.
 - show by preliminary examination that he has a broad and adequate knowledge of the fundamental theological disciplines.
 - show by preliminary examination that he has a working knowledge of such languages (Hebrew, Greek, Latin, French, German) and of such parts of history and philosophy as are necessary in his field of special study.
- When he is enrolled the candidate shall choose a field of special study which has the approval of the department concerned and of the Committee on Advanced Studies of Emmanuel College.
- After enrolment the candidate shall carry on his work under the general supervision of the Committee on Advanced Studies. If he does the work extra-ordinarily he will require not less than six years to complete it. But this period may be reduced if he does the whole work, or any part of it, intrinsically, giving full time to it.

5. The candidate shall work under the direction and to the satisfaction of the department of his special study. His plan of study must be coherent and the studies comprised in it of advanced grade. It may embrace work with other professors than those of Emmanuel College. The whole plan must have the approval of the Committee on Advanced Studies. The candidate must pass such examinations as the Department, working in conjunction with the Committee on Advanced Studies, may require.

6. The candidate shall prepare a thesis on a subject within his field of special study. The subject of the thesis must be approved by the department concerned and by the Committee on Advanced Studies. The thesis must show mastery in the chosen field and give evidence of constructive ability. The thesis when completed shall be read by two or more professors of Emmanuel College who shall report to the Council an estimate of its merit; it shall also be read by one who is not a professor of Emmanuel College and he, too, shall submit a report to the Council. Before the degree is conferred the candidate must pass an oral examination on the subject of the thesis.

III. That any one who has been admitted to the course leading to the degree of doctor of divinity may be admitted to the course, now revised, leading to the degree of doctor of theology ad eundem status.

The benediction was pronounced by Dr. Hunter. The meeting then adjourned.
