- Use citation management software (RefWorks) to create an inventory of archival and secondary sources on the history of Toronto International Caravan.

News Coverage

Newspaper articles and editorials:

- Recount the history of the festival, identifying the names of the founders and the organizers
- Specify the locations where each pavilion was located
- Describe various costumes, food, activities, arts and crafts displayed at Caravan over the decades.
- This information will provide you with the historical context of the festival.

News Coverage

- Look for names of people associated with the festival and cultural organizations that created the pavilions.
- There may be archival record that these individuals and institutions created in the course of making their contributions to Caravan.

- 3) Why were their roles? Why are they important?

- 3) Are there any individuals or organizations described in the article who were present at the festival?

Organization of Archival Records

- **Finding aid:** an inventory of files (or records) in a specific archival collection (fonds).
- Fonds: an archival collection, divided into series.
- Series: a group of files that are similar to one another. They are related as the result of being created, received, or used in the same activity.
- File: a group of items housed in a folder.
- Item: A single archival document.

Organization of Archival Records

- **Subject:** a principal theme or topic of a file.
- Access Conditions: restrictions on requesting a specific file.

RefWorks

A cloud-based bibliographic reference manager. You can use it to:

- Organize your research to keep track of all primary and secondary sources you are consulting for this project
- Generate a bibliography or a works cited list in a variety of formats (books, articles, unpublished archival sources)
- Export and share references from many different research resources (article databases, library catalogue, the Internet, etc.).
