Developing and expanding the New Canadian Library (NCL) series was one of Pratt's major editorial achievements.</p> <p>NCL continues to be recognized as a "prestige imprint on paperback editions of Canadian works." Pratt also worked closely with Malcolm Ross, Peter C. Newman, Margaret Laurence, Irving Layton and other prominent authors.
