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THE BOOK SNIFFERS CLUB


A sensory project created by British artist Justin Wiggan

It aims to help us reconnect with our sense of smell as a mode of "creative investigation," as Wiggan describes it

The Club's activities and initiatives are legitimized as culturally significant in the United Kingdom, with funding provided by Arts Council England

It maintains an online library, where each title in the collection is accompanied by "sniff notes" contributed by the members.

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WHAT MAKES A BOOK RARE?

Historically, rare books have been typically valued for their distinctiveness due to their contents and physical characteristics

In other words, rare books are both important literary texts and historical artifacts

By handling these rare books and inhaling their scent, we can develop a deep appreciation for the importance of their materiality as historical artifacts to the act of reading and learning about the past.

BOOK & CANDLE SNIFFING EXERCISE

- 1) Gently open the book resting in front of you on the table
- 2) Close your eyes and breathe in, inhaling the scent within, letting it fill your nose and stir your mind
- 3) Write down your thoughts; the smells it reminds you of, how they made you feel, and any memories they stirred
- 4) Compare these scents with the artificial smell of the candle. Do you prefer one over another? Why?

How does it contribute to the appeal of books as physical objects?

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CONSTRUCTING A PRELIMINARY SEARCH STRATEGY

- 1) Identify the main concepts in your topic
- 2) Generate keywords to capture each main concept
- 3) Consider synonyms for each main concept
- 4) Connect each term using AND / OR
- 5) Select appropriate research tools to find sources on your topic.
